Attention Instructors, Coaches, and Programs

Please remember, the proper paperwork (LTP, medicals, releases) needs to be completed in order for programs and riders to be eligible to participate.

Registrations will not be accepted for athletes without current medicals. Videos may be taped after the athlete is registered.

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as shown by the performance of the horse are not to be considered more important than the method used by the rider (SO rule 13.2.6). The judge will look for the proper riding seat, the proper use of natural and or artificial aids, and the rider's ability to control the horse, and the use of good horsemanship. Show clothing is always welcome but not required to participate in an Equitation Class.

Obstacle Classes: The judge will look for the athlete successfully completing each obstacle using good horsemanship and proper equitation, the use of aids, and the rider's ability to control the horse. The rider's proper attempt to complete an obstacle will be considered more important than the horse's performance (SO Rule 13.2.6). Show clothing is always welcome but not required to participate in an Obstacle Class.

Showmanship-like and Obstacle Course In-Hand Classes: Since these are non-riding classes, the Athlete/Riders are called Handlers. In both In-Hand classes, the judge will look for the Handler's proper horsemanship and knowledge of the designated pattern or course, but the horse is the focus. It is the Handler's job to make the horse look and perform its best. Traditional showmanship clothing is always welcome but it is not required to participate in an in-hand class.

Dressage Classes: Tests may be ridden or driven in a carriage. Athletes will be judged on the performance of each movement, the straightness, suppleness, rhythm (even paces), contact, impulsion, and collection of the horse, as well as communication between the athlete and horse. All tests may be called/read with the caller standing outside of the arena at A, B, or E. If a test is to be called, lateness in calling the movements and errors in reading the test will not relieve the rider from error penalties. Calling the test is limited to reading the movement as it is written only once. Repeating the movement by the caller will constitute assistance. Traditional dressage show clothing is always welcome but not required to participate in a dressage class.

Equipment

- Local Programs are responsible for using appropriate saddles, safety stirrups, rider footwear, and deciding appropriate adaptive equipment for the horse and rider. Riders may use adaptive equipment without penalty. Riders may in no way be attached to the horse or saddle.
- All riders/drivers/handlers must wear a protective ASTM/SEI approved helmet with full chin harness fastened at all times when the athlete is working with or riding the horse.
- Halters are required for supported classes. The lead line must be fastened to the halter and not to the bridle. The halter may be over or under the bridle as long as it doesn't interfere with the use of the reins or the bit.

Course Layout

- The arena should measure 20 meters wide by 40 meters long, or as close as possible depending on your facility.
- The arena must be defined and/or enclosed by low fence, equine fencing, or walls.
- Videographer Placement: The videographer needs to stand and tape from the following locations: Equitation- Center of the ring.
 - Obstacle Course (mounted and in-hand)- Outside of the ring behind letter C.
 - Dressage Classes- Outside of the ring behind letter C.
 - Showmanship-like- Please follow instructions on class sheet.
 - Trail Class- Center of the ring.

Equitation, Obstacle, and Dressage On-Lead Divisions

Walk Only Divisions:

A Leader is required and one or two side-walkers may be used. The horse will be on the lead at all times.

- 1. Walk Only Equitation Judged at the walk only in both directions. May be asked to halt, circle, or reverse direction.
- 12. Walk Only Obstacles Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt.
- 19. Walk Only Dressage Special Olympics CI Dressage (Walk) Test #1

Novice Walk/Trot Divisions:

A Leader is required and one or two side-walkers may be used. The horse will be on the lead at all times.

- 2. Novice Walk/Trot Equitation Riders may be asked to halt, circle or reverse direction at the walk, and to trot (posting or sitting) a short distance in each direction.
- 13. Novice Walk/Trot Obstacles Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles, a halt, and trotting in each direction.
- 20. Novice Walk/Trot Dressage Special Olympics EQ Level BI Dressage (Walk-Trot) Test #1

Intermediate Walk/Trot Divisions:

A Leader is required and one or two side-walkers may be used. The horse will be off lead at the walk and on lead at the trot.

- 3. Intermediate Walk/Trot Equitation Riders may be asked to halt, circle or reverse direction at the walk, and to trot (posting or sitting) a short distance in each direction.
- 14. Intermediate Walk/Trot Obstacles Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles, a halt, and trotting in each direction.
- 21. Intermediate Walk/Trot Dressage Special Olympics EQ Level BI Dressage (Walk-Trot) Test #1

Equitation, Obstacle, and Dressage Off-Lead Divisions

Walk Only Divisions:

Rider will have a spotter in the ring who will remain close to the horse's head. The horse will be off lead at all times. Any assistance from the spotter will be penalized.

- 4. Independent Walk Only Equitation Judged at the walk only in both directions. May be asked to halt, circle, or reverse direction.
- 15. Independent Walk Only Obstacles Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles and a halt.
- 22. Walk Only Dressage Special Olympics CI Dressage (Walk) Test #1

Independent Walk/Trot Divisions:

Rider will have a spotter in the ring who will remain close to the horse's head. The horse will be off lead at all times. Any assistance from the spotter will be penalized.

- **6. Independent Walk/Trot Equitation** Riders may be asked to halt, circle or reverse direction at the walk, and to trot (posting or sitting) a short distance in each direction.
- 16. Independent Walk/Trot Obstacles Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles, a halt, and trotting in each direction.
- 23. Independent Walk/Trot Dressage Special Olympics EQ Level BI Dressage (Walk-Trot) Test #1

Advanced Walk/Trot Divisions:

Riders will ride independently at the walk and trot. Riders must have a spotter who, at their discretion, will remain in the center of the ring or just outside of the course area. Any assistance from the spotter will be penalized.

- 8. Advanced Walk/Trot Equitation Riders may be asked to halt, circle, and/or reverse direction at the walk and/or trot (posting or sitting).
- 17. Advanced Walk/Trot Obstacles Course will consist of a minimum of four obstacles, a halt, and trotting in each direction.
- 24. Advanced Walk/Trot Dressage Special Olympics EQ Level BI Dressage (Walk-Trot) Test #1

Advanced Walk/Trot/Canter Divisions:

Riders will ride independently at the walk, trot, and canter. Riders must have a spotter who, at their discretion, will remain in the center of the ring or just outside of the course area. Any assistance from the spotter will be penalized.

10. Advanced Walk/Trot/Canter Equitation

Riders may be asked to halt, circle, and/or reverse direction at the walk and/or trot (posting or sitting). Riders will be asked to canter in both directions for a short distance.

18. Advanced Walk/Trot/Canter Obstacles

Course will consist of a minimum of five obstacles, a halt, trotting and a cantering in both directions. Riders must ride the course independently and their spotter will remain just outside of the course area. OPTIONAL cross rail where noted.

25. Advanced Walk/Trot/Canter Dressage - Special Olympics Level A Dressage (Walk-Trot-Canter) Test #1

In-Hand Classes

At the Program/Coach's discretion, either a halter with lead rope or bridle with reins may be used in the In-Hand classes.

- **26.** In-Hand Walk Only Obstacles- At the Program/Coach's discretion, an assistant may be present and used to the capacity deemed appropriate. Points will not be deducted if an assistant is present but will be deduced if the assistant overtly controls the horse. The course will consist of four obstacles and a halt.
- **27.** In-Hand Walk/Trot Obstacles- At the Program/Coach's discretion, an assistant may be present and used to the capacity deemed appropriate. Points will not be deducted if an assistant is present but will be deduced if the assistant overtly controls the horse. The course will consist of four obstacles, trotting, and a halt.
- **28. Non-Independent Showmanship-like With Pattern and Inspection** At the Program/Coach's discretion, an assistant may be present and used to the capacity deemed appropriate. Points will not be deducted if an assistant is present but will be deduced if the assistant overtly controls the horse. One pattern and set-up with inspection. Half system crossover during inspection. The judge may ask the handler questions about their horse.
- **29. Independent Showmanship-like With Pattern and Inspection** Athlete can have an assistant who will remain in the center of the ring (or nearby out of camera view). Any assistance from the assistant will be penalized. One pattern and set-up with inspection. Quartering system crossover during inspection. The judge may ask the handler questions about their horse.

Exhibition Trail Class

At the Program/Coach's discretion, the athlete will ride a trail pattern consisting of three obstacles. A mandatory obstacle must include one in which the rider will open, pass through, and close a gate. The other two obstacles are program's choice. Ideas: stationary bridge, remove and replace item from mailbox, navigate a labyrinth, back through, or any other obstacle you can safely make with poles, barrels, and/or cones.

Entry Information and Important Dates

- Programs entering SO riders must complete and submit LTP form, waivers, and new medicals prior to their first practice.
- Entry Opening date: July 1, 2024. Registrations will not be accepted for athletes without current medicals.
- SO medical forms and Code of Conduct must be completed and submitted by September 30, 2024.
- Refer to SO rules for specific details.
- SO-NJ will validate an athlete's participation for the SO ribbons and medals. The Horse Show Manager/Committee will not have any influence over SO participation.
- Entry Closing date: September 15, 2024. Late entries will not be accepted.
- Video submission folder available to upload videos: September 18, 2023 October 6, 2024.
- Judging will take place on October 12-13, 2024.
- Late videos will not be accepted.
- Each rider may enter one equitation class, one obstacle class, one in-hand class, and one dressage test of the same skill level.

Video Submission Information

- You do not need a special camera to record videos. A cell phone video will work!
- Videographer Placement: The videographer needs to stand and tape from the following locations-

Equitation- Center of the ring

Obstacle Course (mounted and in-hand)- Outside of the ring behind letter C

Dressage Classes- Outside of the ring behind letter C

Showmanship-like- Please follow instructions on class sheet.

- **Step 3.** For best results, the phone/camera should be held horizontally and not be facing into the sun. An indoor or covered arena may be used if the lighting is good. The better the lighting conditions, the better the video will look. Make sure the sound is turned ON.
- **Step 3.** Prior to entering the ring, your videographer must show a cell phone displaying the date and time. Without stopping the video, speak into the camera stating the rider's name and the horse's name, the class or the level and test you are riding and then continue, without editing (no stopping and starting) into the arena. Announce "you are being judged".
- **Step 3.** As soon as the class/test is finished, the camera must approach the horse for a close up view of the horse and rider.
- Step 4. Follow SONJ's video submission instructions.
